



### starting a new life at AAWC. A brief introduction to Apne Aap Women's Collective

Target: Underprivileged women from Falkland Road, Kamathipura, especially those in prostinution



· Set up in 1998, AAWC is a Non Government Organisation (NGO) with no other branches

. To work with women in brothel based prostitution and their children

#### OBJECTIVES

· Women: Be a source of solace, care and support

· Sparrows: Equip the daughters of women in prostitution, with skills and support to pursue a dignified life. This is to ensure that none of them have to turn to prostitution

· Children: Get them used to an educational environment at the formative age, to decrease drop out rates

Since we began nine years ago, we have had nearly 700 women, 165 girls and 85 children Looking forward to 2007 - 2008

Highs and lows of 2007-2008

4 Sparrows got married. 2 of them are daughters of Devadasis.

5 girls were selected for SHE Creates a film making workshop. Conducted by Mammovies, a Mumbai-based social enterprise of young filmmakers

8 girls were placed in jobs, while 9 others in boardings

Out of 38 girls, 12 secured ranks and the rest showed remarkable improvement. One stood first in the whole school.

5 women beneficiaries passed away in 2006 & 4 so far in '07. Main cause was AIDS - TB.

3 Sparrows have been attending advanced beautician training by an NGO Seva Sadan and are promised jobs in affluent parlours.

Started Social Marketing with Hindustan Latex Family Planning Promotion Trust (HLFPPT)...

In the first phase, we will be setting up 6 Condom-Vending Machines (CVMs) on Falkland Road.

We are still looking for highly trained staff.

18 children from our Balwadi (day-time crèche) were placed in government-run formal schools. Now, we are looking to expand this to reach out to more children.

As we all know, our society is male dominated. from the field of education to sports. There are several rights for women in our country. Rights that no one honours. I know that I never had much of a childhood. Until I was 13 yrs, everyone told me that men and women were not equal. At the time, I was in the seventh standard. Like other girls, I used to think that boys could do everything. That 'we' could not win against them. That we were just nothing in front of them.

One day, when I returned from school, I saw two strangers talking to mummy. 'Namaste', they said before asking my name. Then they spoke to my mother and left. I asked mummy about them. She told me that they had come from an organisation that teaches girls. I asked, 'They teach only girls?' She replied, 'Yes, why?' 'I want to go!' I suddenly decided. But she hesitated...

When the didis came again, they spoke to mummy and convinced her to allow me to go. These two didis then told me their names. That evening, for me, was incomparable. They took me to a classroom and told me there were many girls like me who went there to study, work, play, sing, dance and learn a lot of new things. Then I asked them what the name of this place was. They replied Apne Aap. That evening I learned a lot and made many new friends. All the didis were so warm. That evening I returned brimming with joy. Seeing this, my mother let me go there everyday.

Apne Aap fights for the rights of women.

I mentioned earlier how society is male dominated.

Similarly, Apne Aap is female dominated. Every activity is for girls. Apne Aap strives to make us work hard in academics as well learn new skills.

It has given so many of us the strength to do something. Now, we in return will show AAWC, that we can do anything a boy can. We no longer believe that we are less than they are.

Today, I work in a leading Pizzeria. I have come here through AAWC and I am working there as any other boy...

AAWC was my inspiration.


